DR A. PETTY, UNISA

Dr Petty has enjoyed a very long career as a social worker, having worked in the field of social work in different non-governmental welfare organisations, namely, The Association for the Aged, South African National Council for Alcoholism and The Family and Marriage Society of South Africa.

She joined UNISA in 1991 as the regional coordinator of social work placements and ended her 31-year academic career there in 2022. During her tenure at UNISA she developed and implemented the Marriage Guidance Relationship Counselling and the Child Youth and Family Care courses for second and third level students, respectively. She has supervised post graduate students at Masters and Doctoral levels and served as an external examiner of Post Graduate research for the Department of Social Work at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. One of her keen interests as an academic was community engagement which fuelled her motivation to establish the Bright Site Service-Learning Sites for UNISA social work students in the Point, Isnembe and Welbedacht East areas. The research topic of her PhD was, "The development of a culturally and contextually relevant parenting programme for vulnerable parents and caregivers living in Welbedacht East".

She is currently a volunteer for the Domino Foundation, a non-profit organisation, where her role is to promote staff wellness. Additionally, she serves on the Senate Committee at MANCOSA and is an active member of the eThekwini Cluster Veteran Social Work Forum.

Her professional interests remain seeking ways to strengthen families, developing culturally relevant interventions for the South African context, and 4 uplifting the morale and professionalism of social workers.





DR S. DHLUDHLU, UNISA

A Senior Lecturer and Researcher with nine years of experience in academia, having worked at the Department of Social Work, School of Social Sciences, and College of Human Sciences. He is devoted, thorough, and competent. published papers in several journals, guided master's students through their studies, and currently supervising both masters and doctoral candidates. He has experience in statutory social work, youth leaving care, and social development and policy.
